The White Stripes celebrate the 20th anniversary of their fourth studio album *Elephant* with an exclusive deluxe digital version. The remastered audio of the original album has a 27-song live set from a 2003 concert at Chicago's Aragon Ballroom. There will be 2LP vinyl sets available in Red Smoke and Clear with Red and Black Smoke on April 21st. The anniversary is also being recognized with the re-release of the Sofia Coppola-directed video for "I Just Don't Know Myself. Kate Moss stars in the clip that has been remastered in HD.

<u>Jack White</u>, <u>The Raconteurs</u>, and <u>The Dead Weather</u>.


Elephant was originally released on April 1st, 2003, and became critically acclaimed while doing well commercially on the charts. The White Stripes' popularity rose and songs like "Seven Nation Army" and "There's No Home For You Here" entered classic status. Their fourth full-length collection won the 2004 Grammy for Best Alternative Album, was nominated for Album of the Year and "Seven Nation Army" won for Best Rock Song.

Third Man Records Releasing 20th Anniversary Vault Package #55 Of The White Stripes Elephant XX

Third Man Records is releasing *Vault Package #55 The White Stripes — Elephant XX* which is the 20th anniversary expanded edition of their 2003 album. There is a MONO remix of the album on white and red vinyl, a 7-inch red glitter of Jack White's "Hypnotize" demos, a DVD of never-seen footage and a 28-page booklet of unpublished photographs. The package is available through Third Man's Vault Subscription and the cutoff to sign up for #55 is January 31st at midnight CST. Jack White and Bill Skibble mixed the album from the original

multitrack tapes and discovered forgotten bits of the music like four extra bars at the end of "Seven Nation Army."

White's demo for "Hypnotize" is included with two mixes. He gave the song to local Detroit garage band The Hentchmen in 1998 but they never used it. A few years later The White Stripes made their recording of the song and it became one of the most favored in their catalog. The DVD has footage of them performing The Stooges' "I Wanna Be Your Dog" in Japan, an unseen interview with Jack and Meg and more. Throwback: The White Stripes-Seven Nation Army

The White Stripes' "Seven Nation Army" easily became their signature song and pinpointed them as leaders of the garage rock revival movement. The bass-like riff Jack White created from a guitar modified by a pitch shift effect was a call to hear their fourth album *Elephant*. White's orginal intention to use the music for a James Bond movie was scrapped and reutilized for the tune that grew in its reach by the summer of 2003. "Seven Nation Army" scaled the charts and received enormous amounts of love from the critics.Â enthralled with the song and the album which most people agreed was their best work. The video for "Seven Nation Army" was just as infectious as the song itself with Jack and Meg being featured in a neverending diamond-shaped kaleidoscope. The song won the Grammy for Best Rock Song and Elephant took home the award for Best Alternative Music Album. MTV bestowed the Best Editing Award on the Alex and Martindirected video. The single quickly embued itself upon pop culture with its presence being everywhere including huge worldwide sporting events, video games, television shows and political events. Since its release in 2003, "Seven Nation Army" has been categorized as one of the biggest songs of the 2010s on several lists. Elephant was reissued on limited edition red, white and black vinyl in 2013 to mark the 10th anniversary of the album. The White Stripes broke up in 2011 and since then Jack White has recorded as a solo artist and
